

REFLECTION

In his **First Letter to the Corinthians**, St. Paul writes about various issues, but paramount of them all, St. Paul writes about being different, something which Christians in Corinth and Catholics today dare not be in society. Today's society is strikingly similar to milieu of Corinth. Most would consider themselves as Canadians who happen to be Catholic rather than being Catholic who happen to be Canadian.

Corinth was the "lowest" place in the world, the "spiritual gutter" yet its citizens thought of themselves as high. They were well educated yet they produced no philosophers. The most prominent philosophical school was skepticism. The Corinthians were rich due to trade and prostitution. (There was a large temple dedicated to Aphrodite, the goddess of sex). Into that society, St. Paul preached two words disliked the most (even by today's standards): authority (or lordship) and obedience.

The 4 major topics in this first letter are:

(1) **Sectarianism.** St. Paul is scandalized at the factionalism in the Corinthian Church. He sees the proud claim to possess superior "wisdom" and not submitting to Christ as God's Wisdom (1:10-13). The wonderful irony is that God's folly is wiser than human wisdom (1:18-3:23).

(2) **Faith and reason** (Christianity and philosophy). If God's folly is wiser than any philosophy, then philosophers and theologians ought to keep Christo centrism to avoid taking Christians in different and schismatic directions.

(3) **Sex and Love**. St. Paul condemned lax attitudes towards sexual immorality by the Corinthians in Chapters 5 and 6. St. Paul writes that a Christian as a member of Christ's body, makes Christ fornicate with a prostitute (6:15). 1 Cor 12:31-13:8 is one of the most famous passages, usually read at weddings. This passage does not refer to romantic (*eros*) love (of falling in love) but on sacrificial (*agape*) love (of rising in love) shown by Jesus. Christ had prophesied that the world would be able to distinguish Christians from others by the special kind of love they had (Jn 13:35), not having the same kind of love as the world had.

(4) **The resurrection of the dead**, both Christ's and our own. The Greek philosophers in Corinth did not believe in the resurrection of the body because they did not believe that the body was good and that it was not created by God. Their sexual materialism and their philosophical spiritualism went hand in hand. Plato had called the body, "the soul's tomb." For St. Paul, to deny the resurrection of Christ was to deny His divinity. Because of Jesus' divinity, best exemplified in the resurrection, we will be resurrected at the end of time, a promise made by Christ

Himself. Without the resurrection, "our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain" (15:17), and "if for this

life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all men most to be pitied" (15:19). The earthly body will be different from that of the resurrected body. It will be the same but different much like the body of a caterpillar is different from a butterfly before cocooning itself.

In this First Letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul also includes topics on incest, pagan lawyers, eating food offered to idols, prostitution, divorce, the Eucharist, the order in worship, speaking in tongues and other spiritual gifts. As for the Eucharist, St. Paul writes: "whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord. A person should examine himself and so eat the bread and drink the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgment on himself. That is why many among you are ill and infirm and a considerable number are dying" (1 Cor 11:27-30). St. Paul is telling us that the Eucharist which brings Life to the soul can bring spiritual death if the recipient is not in the state of Grace, that is God's Life. If we are in mortal sin, we need to confess of our sins before we partake of the Eucharist.
